

From the Pastor's Desk...

October 2024

I don't think it's any surprise that I love music – event though I can't sing, and I can't play an instrument. There's no specific genre of music I prefer, but in the last years I find myself listening to more and more of the contemporary Christian music. Oftentimes the lyrics speak to me in ways I really need to hear.

There's one song in particular: Even If performed by Mercy Me. The chorus goes like this:

> I know you're able, I know you can Save through the fire, with your mighty hand, But even if you don't, my hope is you alone.

And it's that last line that hits me every time. I struggle with the words, "*but even if you don't.*" I always want to rewrite that one phrase. (Check it out at the end of this letter.)

It's a safe assumption to openly admit that we all pray. Many have told me the times dedicated to your prayer life – every morning, every night, driving in the car, as you listen to music, as you enjoy God's creation in your daily lives, Sunday worship – we all pray. Yet we are uncomfortable in admitting when we think God is not listening, that our prayers often, in our own minds, go unanswered. But do they?

In the Gospel of Mark, chapter 11, verse 24, Mark writes: "So I tell you, whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours." Believe, and it will be yours! But do we do this, do we believe in it?

In the Gospel of Luke, chapter 11, verses 9-10, Luke writes: "So I say to you, Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for every who

knocks, the door will be opened." Ask, search, and knock – it sounds like prayer to me. It's easy to ask for something; yet another thing to go looking for it or knocking on a door unaware of what is on the other side.

In Jeremiah, chapter 33, verse 3, the prophet writes: "*Call to me and I will answer you, and I will tell you great and hidden things that you have not known.*" The great and hidden things we do not know... yet. Maybe it's not that God doesn't answer our prayers; maybe it's simply the fact we are afraid of what the answer might be.


And finally, in 1st Thessalonians, chapter 5, verses 16-18, it reads: "*Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, giving thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.*" Give thanks for <u>all</u> answers, for this is God's will. On the spectrum from none to all, where do we place ourselves in giving thanks?

Based on these passages, and our faith in God, we trust that God is listening to us, and there is always an answer because prayer is never a 'one-way street.' So yes, I struggle with the last line of the chorus. I struggle with putting the blame on God when he has done what he promised. So if I were to rewrite it, perhaps the chorus would go something like this.

I know you're able, I know you can Save through the fire, with your mighty hand, But even if I can't hear it, see it, feel it, my hope is always you alone.

Why those words? Because we can't or don't always hear; we can't or don't always see; we can't or don't always feel his answers. Yet our prayers are always answered; perhaps not the way we want or like, but they are answered, just as God intends.

I'd like to see the day when we become comfortable in prayer, praying aloud for others to hear and pray along. It is true - prayer is a deeply personal connection and relationship with God and Christ Jesus; unique to you and God/Jesus, filled with trust, faith, and love. We can give examples of prayers, talk of our own prayer life, read prayers written by others but think about the impact it will on others to share your prayer as the situation calls for it, because it is a blessing to those who hear you, and a chance to share your faith with those around you. It is a chance to enter a time and space with God and one another.



The truth is that our hope, our trust, our faith is and always will be in God and Christ Jesus, and they to us, *Even If* we don't always recognize it.

Did you know... from The Lutheran Handbook....

The Top 10 BIBLE MIRACLES and what they mean

1. CREATION

God created the universe and everything that is in it, and God continues to create and recreate without ceasing. God's first and on-going miracle was to reveal that the creation has a purpose.

2. The PASSOVER

The Israelites were enslaved by Pharaoh, a ruler who believed that people belonged to him, not to God. In the last of 10 plagues, God visited the houses of all the Egyptians to kill the first-born male in each one. God alone is Lord of the people, and no human can claim ultimate power over us.

3. The EXODUS

God's people were fleeing Egypt when Pharaoh dispatched his army to force them black into slavery. The army trapped the people with their backs to a sea, but God parted the water, and the people walked across to freedom while Pharaoh's minions were destroyed. God chose to free us from all forms of tyranny so we may use that freedom to serve God and each other.

4. MANNA

After the people crossed the sea to freedom, they complained that they were going to starve to death. They even asked to go back to Egypt. God sent manna, a form of bread, so the people lived. God cares for us even when we give up, pine for our slavery, and lose faith. God never abandons us.

5. The INCARNATION

The immortal and infinite God became a human being, choosing to be born of a woman. God loved us enough to become one of us in Jesus of Nazareth, forever bridging the divide that had separated us from God.

6. JESUS HEALED the Paralyzed Man

Some men brought a paralyzed friend to Jesus. Jesus said, "Son, your sins are forgiven." (Mark 2:5). This means that Jesus has the power to forgive our sins – and he does so as a free gift.

7. JESUS CALMED the STORM

Jesus was asleep in a boat with his disciples when a great storm came up and threatened to sink it. He said, "Peace! Be still!" (Mark 4:39). Then the storm immediately calmed. Jesus is Lord over even the powers of nature.

8. The RESURRECTION

Human beings executed Jesus, but God raised him from the dead on the third day. Through baptism, we share in Jesus' death, so we will also share in eternal life with God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Christ conquered death.

9. PENTECOST

Jesus ascended from the earth, but he did not leave the church powerless or alone. On the 50th day after the Jewish Passover (*Pentecost* means 50th), Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to create the church and take up residence among us. The Holy Spirit is present with us always.

10. The SECOND COMING

One day, Christ will come again and end all suffering. This means that the final result of the epic battle between good

Luther's Small Catechism (a refresher course)

Many have asked about reviewing Luther's Small Catechism – especially the information covered in our confirmation classes. Continuing with each month, we will review in our newsletters things our confirmation students are required to know and understand in and from Luther's catechism.

This month, we continue with the Confession. It is listed, along with Martin Luther's explanation – taken directly from the Small Catechism.

1. What is Confession?

Answer: Confession consists of two parts. One is that we confess our sins. The other is that we receive the absolution, that is, forgiveness, from the pastor as from God himself and by no means doubt but firmly believe that our sins are thereby forgiven before God in heaven.

Which sins is a person to confess?

Answer: Before God one is to acknowledge the guilt for all sins, even those of which we are not aware, as we do in the Lord's Prayer. However, before the pastor we are to confess only those sins of which we are aware and which trouble us

Which sins are these?

Answer: Here reflect on your place in life in light of the Ten Commandments: whether you are father, mother, son, daughter, employer, employee; whether you have been disobedient, unfaithful, lazy; whether you have harmed anyone by word or deed; whether you have stolen, neglected, wasted, or injured anything.

2. How to confess your sins and receive forgiveness?

Answer: Confession is an "office of the keys" belonging to all baptized persons, that is, anyone may confess and aby believer may pronounce the word of forgiveness. A declaration of forgiveness is permanent and binding because it comes from Jesus Christ himself.

- a. Make a mental list of your offenses
- b. Locate a fellow Christian When appropriate, confess your sins to another person.
- c. Resolve to confess of your own free will Don't confess merely because someone else wants you to do it. Make your confession voluntary.
- d. Make your confession fearlessly.

Confess the sins that burden you, and then confess the sins of which you are not aware or can't remember.

- e. Avoid making up sins. More important than the facts and figures is a spirit of repentance in your heart.
- f. Receive forgiveness as it is given, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

God forgives you fully. Make the sign of the cross to help you remember.

g. Resolve to live joyfully and penitently.With absolution comes new life in the freedom of God's grace.
